PURPOSE OF ROLE

The Programme Leader is responsible to the Head of Dance Programmes and Head of Dance Science for the leadership and management of the BSc (Hons) Dance Science within the Faculty of Dance at Trinity Laban. You will be responsible for ensuring the delivery of the programme, operating within the context of the Institution's undergraduate provision and within the broader activities in dance science, in accordance with Trinity Laban's mission, the stated aims and objectives of the Programme and the standards set for student achievement.

The focus of the Programme Leader role is ensuring that the teaching and students' learning experiences are consistent with the expectations of good practice in higher education. The post holder is responsible for coordination of the staff teaching on the Programme, and ensuring that module leaders are conversant with the Institution's mechanisms for academic standards and quality assurance as they apply to the Programme.

Alongside responsibility for the continuing development of the Programme, a significant aspect of the role is the recruitment of students: in consultation with the Head of Dance Programmes and Head of Dance Science, this will include monitoring of student recruitment and developing initiatives and procedures for recruitment of students to the programme. Additionally, the Programme Leader will work with the Development Department to ensure that alumni remain connected with the Programme and the Institution, so that graduates are supported in their transition to professional work, and can feed back into future curriculum developments.

At an operational level, the Programme Leader is responsible for ensuring that the Programme and its resources are effectively managed and operated on a cost efficient basis. You will be required to establish and maintain effective working practices with other internal departments, programmes and areas of activity and to ensure that their activities are connected with the overall group of programmes at undergraduate level.

In addition to the duties as Programme Leader, the post holder will normally be required to make a substantial contribution to teaching within the programme for which you will be responsible as well as across other programmes within the institution at levels 4-7.

MAIN DUTIES

- Leading and facilitating the engagement of all staff of the Programme team.
- Ensuring that learning, teaching and assessment practices on the Programmes are consistent with Institutional practices and good practice in higher education.
- Coordination and delivery of annual review of the Programmes, including drafting of the Annual Programme Evaluation for scrutiny by the Programme Committee.
- Liaising with relevant departments in support of learning and teaching on the Programmes: Learning Enhancement; Research; Learning & Participation; Production; Costume; Library & Archive; Student Services; Marketing & Communications; Registry and Academic Administration; Admissions.
- Identifying the resource requirements for the Programme and following Institutional procedures for consideration of these in the context of resourcing all Trinity Laban's postgraduate programmes, for example: staffing; space; specialist dance science facilities and equipment; capital goods; consumables.
- Working within the delegated budget allowance for the Programme, and authorising timetable and teaching resource usage in consultation with the Head of Dance Programmes.
- Liaising with the academic quality and administration teams to ensure that staff teaching on the Programmes are conversant with operational administrative systems and mechanisms for quality assurance.
- Maintaining procedures for recruitment of students to the Programmes, participating in recruitment activities, and monitoring recruitment with the relevant staff team(s).
- Chairing meetings of the Programme teams, and serving as a member of the undergraduate Committee (Dance) and other boards, committees and working groups as appropriate.
- Maintaining purposeful links with relevant professional networks to enable you to make an informed contribution to the currency and relevance of the Programme
- Acting as an advocate for Trinity Laban, attending a range of events and representing Trinity Laban in educational, professional and/or other contexts as appropriate.

In carrying out the duties and responsibilities of the post, the Programme Leader will work in conjunction with the Head of Dance Programmes and Head of Dance Science and other senior managers within the context of undergraduate provision at Trinity Laban.

- To make a substantial contribution to teaching within the institution; normally this will be within the programme for which you are responsible as Programme Leader, alongside contribution to other programmes at Trinity Laban as appropriate (appendix 1).

APPENDIX 1 MODULE LEADING AND LECTURING

Candidates should specify the subject areas for which they would like to be considered:

Undergraduate

- Functional Anatomy and Physiology (level 4): Practice-based module introducing the fundamentals of functional anatomy and physiology in relation to the musculoskeletal, neural, metabolic, respiratory and cardiovascular systems. Practical and interactive workshops will provide students with theoretical and embodied knowledge of the anatomy and basic biomechanics of the moving body and the physiological responses of the body to dance and exercise.
- Motor Skill Learning (level 4): Practice-based module introducing foundational theories and concepts in motor skills learning. It is designed to facilitate students' ability to recognise how movement is organised and coordinated to achieve specific neuromuscular patterns in dance practice.
- Technical Practice (level 4, 5 and/or 6): Practice-based modules across the three years focusing on the development of personal physical and technical skills in exercise, movement and dance through regular participation in focused classes. Fundamental knowledge, understanding and individual capabilities will be extended in levels 5 and 6 within modules Technical Practice II and Technical Practice III.
- Nutrition (level 4): Module will include an exploration of energy balance, macronutrients, micronutrients, hydration, and clinical applications of nutrition. Students will develop knowledge of nutritional recommendations for public health and athletic populations, as well as skills in the study of dietary analysis and body composition.
- Researching Dance Science I (level 4): Module provides a fundamental introduction
 to the skills required for undergraduate study and scientific research. The module will
 introduce students to the principles of qualitative and quantitative research in dance
 and dance science, research ethics and the basic elements of data analysis.
- Analysis of Performance (level 5): Practice-based module brings together elements
 of Biomechanics and Choreological Practice providing methodologies through which
 to analyse the performance of movement and dance. Students will engage with the
 methods of observing, analysing, recording and embodying movement and dance to
 evaluate and appreciate the complexities of the dancing body within a specific artistic
 context.
- Performance Psychology (level 5): Module introduces key psychological perspectives, concepts and processes that underpin human performance and its application to dance. The module will examine the cognitive, behavioural, emotional, motivational, and social processes in dance in relation to performance enhancement, health and wellbeing, and career development.
- Researching Dance Science II (level 5): Module extends and enhances the knowledge, understanding and skills gained from Researching Dance Science I module preparing students for more advanced methods of data collection, analysis and interpretation. It will provide the skills to plan and write-up a research project from initial concept and design, to implementation, analysis and dissemination.
- Training Strategies for Dance, Exercise and Fitness (level 6): Module is focused
 on the application of physiological training principles to advance both general physical
 fitness and dance-specific conditioning. Students will investigate how training and
 practice interconnect to improve physical functioning and skill proficiency.

• Creative Arts and Health (level 6): Module introduces students to definitions, concepts and models of health and wellbeing and encourages them to examine critically, the relationship between creative arts, health and wellbeing.

Postgraduate

- Performance Enhancement: (Exercise Physiology) (level 7): Module eextends students' knowledge and understanding of selected theoretical areas of exercise physiology and their application to dance practice.
- Research Methods: (level 7): Module explores a range of research procedures and methodologies (from the perspective of the performing arts and the scientific paradigms), enabling students to investigate and articulate research at Masters Level within their own field of practice.
